New Zealand mixed pairs champions: John and Jenelle bowl their way to the top

Geraldine local John Whiting says, "If anyone had told us at the start of the day, we would go undefeated, win all seven games and come



home as the New Zealand Indoor Bowls Mixed Pairs Champions, I wouldn't have believed them." But that is precisely what John and Timaru bowling partner Jenelle Lockyer did in Upper Hutt last weekend.

"We had so many dramas before we even got to the event. The thick fog at Timaru Airport delayed our 6.45am flight for three-and-a-half hours, eventually leaving the tarmac at 10.15am."

'Our nerves were pretty high as we thought we would have to default the first game, but the organisers agreed to delay the start, and we got there with around three minutes to spare. We had time for a quick drink, a sausage roll, and we went straight into our first game."

Jenelle says, "We were extremely grateful to another couple of teams that purposely waited at the airport for us to make sure the organisers would delay the start, which shows the true sportsmanship between the teams. We certainly had a rollercoaster of emotions from all the delays and then the rush to the centre to begin our first game."

To represent South Canterbury at the nationals, John and Jenelle first won the South Canterbury mixed pairs and then the zone final, which featured Canterbury, Ashburton, North Otago, and South Canterbury.

John says, "Just to get to the nationals was amazing, and something both Jenelle and I have really been looking forward to. We have both had a really good season."

The New Zealand Indoor Bowls championship consists of a round-robin competition. John and Jenelle's opponents included many New Zealand representatives, including the defending national champions. The pair's second game, against mother-and-son pair Carol Wright (Auckland) and Paul Wright (New Zealand representative), was won by John on the very

John says, "We opened a few eyes in game four when we beat defending champions Ashley Diamond and Sheree Holmes from Upper Hutt. Everyone started wondering who this team from South Canterbury were. There was an elderly couple that followed us to every game after we won that one, and they ended up our biggest fans there on the day."

Janelle says, "After winning game six, because we had gone undefeated with only one game to go, we had already won the title; no one could beat us on points even if we lost the last game. However, John and I agreed we wanted

to go out there, do our absolute best and win that last game regardless. We wanted to finish the day on a high."

The defending champions eventually finished in second place, with the Wrights placing third.

Both John and Jenelle are still pinching themselves. "It is still hard to believe that we won, that we are the New Zealand champions," says Jenelle. "It really hasn't sunk in yet. It was a great team effort. We both have similar games and similar shots. John encourages me to play shots I don't think I can, but he knows I can. I really enjoy playing with him."

It was a good thing the competition was smooth sailing for the pair, as the journey home was again hampered by fog.

John says, "We had our landing gear down for arrival in Timaru on Sunday night, only for the plane to climb back up again. We flew back to Christchurch and then endured a twoand-a-half-hour bus trip back to Timaru Airport. I then had to collect my car and drive home to Geraldine, finally getting home at 1.15am on Monday. It certainly will be a weekend to remember, in more ways than one."

Historic water flumes restored

historic water supply, which served the town between 1902 and 1978, has been restored, thanks to financial support from individuals and groups, including the Geraldine Community Board and the practical skills of local enthusiasts.

First conceptualised in 1888, a sequence of flumes was integral to the supply, which drew water from the Waihi River. Its capacity

The last surviving section of Geraldine's up incrementally until the present Ōrari the four-metre flume section to its Back Road well system superseded it.

The old supply was sound, says flume restoration spokesperson John Sullivan. an interpretive panel. Geraldine Historical He says, "As we progressed with the work, we realised what a great old system the old water supply was." He and his corestorers did the work off-site. "We took it to Four Peaks [Transport]. We did the restoration there." They used totara, and water quality measures were beefed the original material, and have returned

original site.

Complementing the physical work is Society committee member Bev Gregan assembled its content. She says, "John was looking for information. I work at the museum, so I did the research."

Waihi Lodge: South Island's best small aged care facility

Waihi Lodge manager Mike van der Heyden says that on Monday of last week, he received a call from the organisation Aged Advisor to say that Waihi Lodge has received an award as Best Aged Care Small Facility 2022. He was advised that Aged Advisor representative Nigel Matthews would attend on Friday morning to present it. Staff and members of the board duly gathered for a celebratory morning tea.

Nigel says he founded Aged Advisor with two other people after experiencing the aged care sector with their own families. He says, "There were good experiences and some not so good. We wanted to find a way of encouraging best practice in aged care." The organisation, launched in 2015, makes awards to the best large and small

facilities on both islands.

Nigel explains that the award is made based on positive client reviews. "We do check to make sure that the reviews are genuine." According to the company website, prior to the founding of Aged Advisor, there was no basis to compare different facilities in the market. "With the growth rate of people 65+ expected to double over the next 15 years, more New Zealanders will be looking for retirement or rest-care options. Our current aged care facilities are already operating at high occupancy levels, and rest-care providers are building new facilities to cater to the increasing market - and yet no site existed to review and compare these facilities in this rapidly growing demographic within New Zealand."

In accepting the award, Mike acknowledged the staff's dedication, the board's unpaid work and the many volunteers whose combined efforts make life at Waihi Lodge such a positive experience. Chairman Stuart Blake commended the team for the achievement on behalf of the board.

Mike says there are still people in the Geraldine area who don't know about the facility, which is an arm of Seniorcare Geraldine. Waihi Lodge is a community-owned home supported by the voluntary efforts of the wider Geraldine community.



Te Moana upgrade

In response to last week's article about the sudden increase in Te Moana water rates (GNews 15.09.22), Timaru District Council Group Manager Infrastructure Andrew Dixon writes:

To fund the \$3 million of upgrades required to bring the Te Moana scheme up to the necessary drinking water standards, we've had to increase the rates scheme users pay. While this is a significant up-front investment, it is paid over a long period of time to balance the cost between current and future users.

In addition to the upgraded capital cost, the increased sophistication of the water treatment plant required to provide a robust and high-quality drinking water supply has increased our operating costs.

We have tried to keep costs at as sustainable a level as we can, including sourcing \$800,000 of central Government support for this project, but the cost of running and upgrading a small water supply scheme like Te Moana, which has fewer than 700 connections, is still significant.

Targeted water rates (like all Council rating charges) are reviewed and set annually through the Annual Plan process prior to 1 July each year, which is the date they take effect. The rates change from year to year and recover the capital works and operational costs associated with the Te Moana Water Supply Scheme. We do not cross-subsidise rural water schemes, so users can be assured that the money they pay into the scheme goes to the running and upgrade of only their scheme.

As the upgrades are nearing completion, the 2022/23 rates invoice is the first that features these increased costs. These increased costs were identified in our 2022/23 Annual Plan.

As background, Te Moana was commissioned in the 1970s, and although it has been well maintained over the years, much of the infrastructure has reached the end of its service life. The investment is required to bring the scheme up to current national drinking water standards and ensure it can cope with the declining source water quality caused by more frequent and significant rain events we have seen.
